Attendance Matters at BCES!

In the last Comet Newsletter, I shared our new recognition for students who are "here at school every day, ready to learn." Students who are in school for the month, who arrive to school on time and who remain in school for the entire day, are recognized during our morning announce-



ments. Students are also entered into a drawing to help with the morning announcements. Those students help Mr. Geller, our Physical Education teacher, with the daily Pledge of Allegiance. Each month students will have a new opportunity to participate.

Below please find the number of students who had "Perfect Attendance" each month:

December:	250 students
January:	220 students
February:	
March:	209 students

All of the students received "Perfect Attendance" certificates.

Here are some facts about school attendance taken directly from the website www.attendanceworks.org:

1. Absenteeism in the first month of school can predict poor attendance throughout the school year. Half the students who miss 2-4 days in September go on to miss nearly a month of school.

- 2. An estimated 5 million to 7.5 million U.S. students miss nearly a month of school each year.
- 3. Absenteeism and its ill effects start early. One in 10 kindergarten and first grade students are chronically absent. Poor attendance can influence whether children read proficiently by the end of third grade or be held back.
- 4. By 6th grade, chronic absence becomes a leading indicator that a student will drop out of high school.
- 5. Research shows that missing 10 percent of school, or about 18 days in most school districts, negatively affects a student's academic performance. That's just two days a month and that's known as chronic absence.
- 6. The academic impact of missing that much school is the same whether the absences are excused or unexcused. Suspensions also add to lost time in the classroom.
- When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances for graduating.

FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Hello parents and guardians! Spring will be here soon, which means, of course, the school year will begin to move along rapidly, culminating with the state testing cycle, and ultimately graduation for the Class of 2017 in June! The students have worked hard to this point, but we will ask for more than ever, as we continue to prepare then for success both in school and beyond.

I am often puzzled when I see students that may not be working up to their ability. I want to share with you an experience I had. I traveled to Cap Haitien, Haiti, with a group of Liberty Rotary club members on a mission to install potable drinking water systems in 1000 homes. Part of this experience included meeting and speaking with several locals (through interpreters) about their needs, one of which includes having clean water to drink everyday. These families are truly just trying to survive, and taking whatever steps they need to do just that, which includes drinking water from the same streams they use for their bathroom needs. Many of the young children I spoke with communicated how much they loved going to school, being with their friends, and how they wanted to improve their lives. Despite all of the disadvantages they must contend with, they fight to do better each and every day.

Yet, some of our students seem content with doing the bare minimum in school! I see in these students the potential to do so much more, but for whatever reason they cite, they are not motivated to do their very best all of the time. In a recent assembly honoring those students that made the honor roll, I challenged each student, no matter what their current level of success is, to do better! All of these students will be competing, whether in school or the workplace, with other students that weren't content with doing the minimum required. While the children in Cap Haitien understand just how good American children have it, American children sometimes do not.

Please remind your child about the need to do their very best at all times! Remind them of the blessings we all have that we take for granted; things such as food, water, education and safety. Now, more than ever, our students need to continue to push forward and excel, to insure success for not only themselves, but for their families and community. Best wishes to all as we begin the spring semester!

Robotics Team Travels to Kentucky

The Fallsburg Jr. High Robotics team represented New York State middle school teams at the VEX Robotics World Championships April 19-23 in Louisville KY. The event features the top 3% of all teams worldwide from 15 different countries. In total, there were 180 middle school teams.

The team had a rough start losing their first three matches. However the team got to work and solved the electrical and mechanical issues that were plaguing their bot. This included completely rebuilding their robots chassis (base and drivetrain), that was accidentally destroyed during the first day of competition. Their record at the end of qualifiers was 4 wins and 6 losses, and the team finished 52nd in their division of 80 teams.

The competition ends each year with the reveal of the challenge for the next year. The students are all hoping to build on their success this year, and have an even better season next year.



Fallsburg Hall of Fame. He retired in 1984 after thirty-five years as an outstanding Art Teacher. One of his students and later a colleague Eileen Kalter remembers him for inspiring her and countless others with



a life-long appreciation of art. Another colleague Terry Dungan acknowledged him for his full involvement with the life around him and enriching everything with his art: "His notion of service, giving his time and art to his community has been the hallmark of Bob Longo's life."

Mr. Longo has been honored with numerous awards for his artwork, murals adorning Town buildings, and contributions to founding and supporting Sullivan County artist societies. A member of the Fallsburg Lions Club for over 60 years, he earned the highest achievement in Lionism, the Melvin Jones Award, and has designed award winning commemorative pins worn by Lions throughout the world.

He is very proud of serving in the Army Air Corps as one of World War II's Greatest Generation. Two years ago, he flew to Washington, DC to view the World War II Memorial as part of the Honor Flight of veterans. Even now at age 96, he stays in touch with the few survivors of his squadron and their families.

Official induction into the Hall of Fame occurs on June 25, 2017 as part of the Class of 2017 Graduation ceremonies.
