## SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Dear School Community Member:

I think we were all reeling in disbelief as we learned about the horrible school shooting that took place recently in Parkland, Florida. It just shocks our collective conscience to hear about yet another school shooting, of such unimaginable magnitude, in our great country.

As we deal with this terrible news, some may wonder if our own kids are safe? We might further wonder about what our school district is doing to prepare for something like this? Under the current backdrop of school violence on a national level, these are normal questions to wonder about.

While we all know that there are no absolute guarantees in life, I want to assure you, as Superintendent of Schools, that we are taking all necessary precautions to ensure the safety of all of our students and staff. The 1400 students in our district are surrounded by staff members and police officers (one School Resource Officer in each building). Beyond supervision, we have a number of initiatives in place all in the name of safety.

In December we held a community-wide presentation on disaster preparedness that featured what to do in case of an active shooter. The staff members and community members that were present for this presentation had nothing but positive reviews about the quality of the presentation and its importance in today's national climate.

One of the resources used in that presentation was a video called 480 Seconds. It is about how to survive an active shooter situation should you find yourself in one. The video was created by Homeland Security and Emergency Services and is available via this link: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CVgXH7smBCK>.

I recommend that all parents take the time to watch this video because while scary, it answers many questions you may have about an active shooter event. If you do not have access to a computer, please contact me and I will arrange an opportunity for you to view the video in my office.

Additionally, we continue our anti-bullying efforts because we know that bullying exists everywhere and we want to take as many steps as we can to address this as a continued district-wide priority. On February 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>, we held anti-bullying presentations (Sweethearts and Heroes) for district students and we also had a special evening presentation for parents and all school community members. The reviews I have received from the students and community members who were present indicate that it was one of the best presentations that we have ever held at the school. While I am very happy to get those kinds of reviews, what is more important to me, as superintendent of schools, is how we follow-up with the good lessons we saw and learned. And follow-up we will.

Our ongoing school anti-bullying program (Olweus) will integrate the lessons learned at those presentations to bolster our current initiatives. Our staff is excited about our ongoing commitments regarding anti-bullying efforts because they know that these problems exist and it is our job to support a safe environment for our students.

In terms of additional building security, our current building project has made school safety a top priority. At the junior-senior high school and the elementary school there will be security upgrades which will include the addition of new entrance vestibules. Anyone entering a school building will have to pass through security checks within the new vestibule before being permitted to enter the school building. These vestibules will add

brand new layers of safety relative to building access. In addition to these vestibules, other safety upgrades will be made during this project to protect students and staff from intruders. Work on these security upgrades will take place over the next two summers.

I can't tell you that we have all of the answers when it comes to the terrible events that are plaguing school districts around the country. I wish I did. What I can tell you is the steps that we are taking as a school district to be prepared for the unknown. From our school safety teams to our school resource officers, from anti-bullying programs to our

alert staff and supportive parents, we have a strong foothold on school safety.

# FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Greetings everyone! I hope this finds everyone well and looking forward to the warmer days of spring! It certainly seemed like it would never get here, but in a very few short weeks we'll all be once again caught up in the renewed energy that spring brings!

This time of year is challenging for a number of students in many ways, but for those students whose attendance is not "exemplary" many will face a unique challenge relative to our attendance policy. Any student that has reached 30 unexcused class absences for a full-year course or 15 for a half-year course is no longer eligible to take the final examination for that course! You might ask what the difference is between an "excused" and "unexcused" absence? An excused absence is any absence that is documented either by a doctor's note, or is the result of a school-related conflict. An example of an excused absence would be if a student misses math class one day to attend a lesson in band. Because the school encourages lesson attendance for band students and they miss class

once a month to attend the lesson, the absence from the class is excused and does not count against the student for the attendance requirement. However, if a student is home sick, or missed school because they overslept, they receive an unexcused absence. One more thing to note is that I am referring to class absences, not school absences. For example, a student may come late to school one day at 9:00. The student will not be marked absent for the entire day of school, however, because they arrived at 9:00 they missed their A period class. They will receive an unexcused absence for that class. In theory, a student could be late to school 30 times over the course of the school year and not be allowed to take their A period class final. This could mean the difference between passing and failing the class!

If a student reaches 40 unexcused absences for a full-year class (or 20 for a half-year class), the student cannot even attend summer school to make up the class! This would have dire consequences for a senior student as

it may prevent them from graduating in June. If the student cannot attend summer school, it means they would have to return in the fall to make up the class they missed. Obviously, this is a circumstance we never want to see! For students that are chronically absent, the school is required to make a report to Child Protective Services.

If your child is absent from school repeatedly, please sit with them and review the attendance policy to ensure that they are meeting the necessary requirement. Obviously, you "have to be in it to win it" and if a student is regularly missing school they are at great risk for failure. We are here to help in any way we can! Please call your child's guidance counselor if you are unsure about your child's attendance.

I thank you for your attention to this important matter. Together, we can make all students successful!

## Super Heroes Rock at Fallsburg

"Sweethearts & Heroes" presented their anti-bullying program to more than one million school children during the past eight years. Thanks to the generosity of Phil Vallone and Rolling V Bus Company, FCSD received the full presentation. Presenter Tom Murphy was a champion on the Mixed Martial Arts circuit; Rick Yarosh was an Army Sergeant and Wounded Warrior in Iraq.

Bullying is mean and scary behavior done over and over again against smaller and weaker people. In the 1500's bully meant "sweetheart" or serving to make someone a better person. In less than a century, it took on the modern meaning; and now America suffers from a bullying epidemic. Sweethearts & Heroes demonstrates what schools and communities can do to eradicate bullying behaviors.

In two full days and one evening, grades K-3, 4-6, 7-9, 10-12, staff from both buildings, and parents participated in age appropriate programs. Everyone hears the impact of bullying on peer groups, positive ways to confront the behavior of bullies and how to empower bystanders. Tom and Rick teach the Five Bully Buttons: #1 Perspective; #2 H.O.P.E.; #3 Sweethearts; #4 Jump into Action; and #5 Heroes.

Social alienation and isolation creates bullying. Fifty-eight percent of Americans believe kids deserve to be bullied! Every school day 170,000 kids are "sick" and





many of them are afraid at school. Eighty percent of bullying happens in front of bystanders. Most dramatically, intones Murphy, "A half million to one million young people will consider suicide this year. The main reason is hopelessness. These kids can be bullies or victims. Why have 10 to 14 year olds reached this level of despair and what can we do?"

Rick Yarosh shares his story of hope. In 2006, his tank in Iraq ran over an IED. The ensuing explosion and fire caused Rick the loss of the bottom part of his right leg, loss of his ears and most of his nose, and scar tissue on his face and most of his body. He lost hope only for a brief moment when saw himself dying in the intense flames. But he continued to roll on the ground outside the burning tank until he doused the flames. He endured many months of surgeries, setting of a prosthetic lower right leg, and more months of rehabilitation.

Once he was able to leave a hospital, it was an effort for him to venture out in public because of his appearance. In a restaurant a five-year-old girl saw Rick and asked her grandfather about him. He suggested she go say hello to him. She walked towards Rick, and he said, "Hey." She hurried back to her grandfather and said, "He's really nice." Three words changed Rick's life forever. He told the children in the audience, "You may not recognize it yet, but you possess the H.O.P.E. that many seek. You can save or change a life. You can create an environment of HOPE-hold on, possibilities exist."

That little girl awakened Rick's innate hopefulness. Sweethearts in our lives push us to be better as Rick and Tom acknowledged in their own lives.

In role playing with students, Murphy reveals their inner Sweethearts, how to jump into action, and how to transform into Heroes. He shows them how to intervene with a bully, how to take the victim away to safety, how to befriend the victim as a buddy or how to call for help immediately to end the bullying.

Students see that they are empowered to take a stand - not just stand by! Murphy quotes Albert Einstein: "The world is a dangerous place to live, not because of the people who are evil, but because of the people who don't do anything about it." Murphy looks intently at the faces of the children and says: "You are willing to do what others are not willing to do. Kids are going to solve the problems of other kids. You are the true Sweethearts and Heroes."

This program can go a long way to help change the climate in a school building. Ask those from the Fallsburg community that witnessed Tom Murphy and Rick Yarosh. Tom and Rick showed that Sweethearts and heroes can and do exist in real life.



## A "Souper" Bowl in February for the BCES SGA

In late January, BCES Math Coach and Advisor to the school's Student Government Association (SGA), Peter Dworetzky saw that a school district was collecting soup cans to donate to a local food in their town prior to the Super Bowl. He shared this story with the SGA kids and asked if they would like to do this in Fallsburg, and they jumped at the idea. So, this is how the "Souper" Bowl came to BCES.



The SGA divided the school into two groups, Pre-K through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and grades 3 through 6, to create a competition. In a few weeks, five huge boxes of soup and related non-perishables were gathered by the teams. The SGA kids did a great job to serve people in the Town of Fallsburg. They knew that people would be grateful to enjoy hot soup in the cold weather. On the afternoon of February 13<sup>th</sup>, Mr. Dworetzky delivered the boxes to the St. Andrews Episcopal Church Food Pantry in South Fallsburg.
