SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Dear School Community Member:

I hope this issue of the Comet Newsletter finds you in the very best of health and spirit! While we are in the midst of winter and are anxiously awaiting the arrival of spring, we find ourselves with 6 remaining snow days (at the time of this writing). I would like to take this moment to explain what will happen with our snow day allotment for the remainder of this school year.

Because winter weather is so unpredictable, we have, as you know, built snow days into the school calendar. This year we built in 10 snow days. The snow days are built in to ensure that we give students the 180 days of required school time each year. We have had years were the winters were so bad we not only used up all of our allotted snow days, but we had to shorten spring breaks because we ran out of snow days. In other years, the winters didn't cause many school closures and we were able to tack on unused snow days (a.k.a. Give Back Days) to the spring recess and Memorial Day weekend breaks. Only Mother Nature knows what is truly in store for us over the next couple of months.

At this time, the school district has six (6) snow days left on the schedule. Give back days (days that we will be closed) will be used as follows:

If 6 snow days are left - school will be closed May 22nd, April 2nd, April 3rd, April 14th, April 15th, and March 13th.

If 5 snow days are left - school will be closed May 22nd, April 3rd, April 14th, April 15th, and March 13th.

If 4 snow days are left- school will be closed May 22nd, April 14, April 15, and April 3rd.

If 3 snow days are left – school will be closed May 22nd, April 14th, and April 15th.

If 2 snow days are left – school will be closed May 22nd and April 14th.

If 1 snow day is left – school will be closed May 22nd.

If there are any changes to the school calendar, I will send letters home to parents, and we will put that information on the district website (fallsburgcsd.net) and on our Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/FallsburgCSD/).

Here is wishing us an early spring!



Emergency Situations

How do we prepare students for emergency situations and how are parents informed when they occur?

Be Safe, Be There, Be Ready: Three of the most important expectations at BCES. You may hear your child, or children in your community, talking about evacuations, lock downs and lock outs and wonder why they would be talking about these things. They are only children after all. Our staff and students take our safety very seriously. In order to prepare for an emergency, we must practice procedures for those emergencies. This is not meant to scare children, it is meant to ease their minds so everyone (adults and children) know what to do when the unexpected happens.

During the school year, teachers practice drill procedures in their classrooms. We then practice as an entire building. I am sure we can all remember fire drills and "Duck and Cover" drills from our own school experience. Practicing for emergency situations is not new. There may be new terms used for the drills, but all the drills are meant to teach students and staff how to handle emergency situations, so we remain calm and safe.

With six months of school under our belt, the students and staff at BCES have practiced drills in their classrooms, as well as several fire drills and evacuation drills to the front field. Throughout the school year we will continue to have these types of drills in addition to other drills such as:

- lock down drills which are used when there is possible danger within the building.
- lockout drills that are used when there is possible danger outside of our building.
- hold-in-place drills which are used for minor, immediate situations that require the hallways to be cleared.
- shelter-in-place drills that are used for weather-related events where there is time to move to another location.

How are parents informed when an actual emergency occurs?

When there is an emergency, such as an early dismissal due to inclement weather, a power outage, or a larger emergency such as an evacuation of the school grounds, we want to be sure that parents are informed. As a building, and as a district, we have developed an Emergency Response Plan. This plan is reviewed yearly and is followed by our Crisis Team members and staff. The plan includes how to handle various incidents in order to keep the students and staff safe.

In the event of an incident, the school will:

- Disseminate information via e-mail, radio announcements, Facebook and the school website to inform parents about what is known to have happened.
- Implement a plan to manage phone calls and parents who arrive at the school.
- Describe how the school and school district are handling the situation.
- Provide a phone number, web site address or recorded hotline where parents can receive updated incident information.
- If warranted, inform parents and students when and where school will resume.

These were kids who were shy or needed to feel more connected with other students. The educators researched and brainstormed and developed their program. They went to FCSD's administrative staff with their ideas and received approval to launch the initial effort with the support of the Fallsburg After School Program Grant.

Beginning with a small group of boys, Mr. Dworetsky and Mr. Persten met the students one day a week at 8am, before school began. Since then the program has grown to two days per week, the number of children has grown by four-fold, now includes girls, and has the in-class support of several other staff members including Sharon Olvera, Lori Lindridge, Lionel White and Emily Ugolino.

Mr. Persten remembers telling a parent about the new program and how it could benefit their son. They agreed and that's how the buddy class has continued to grow. The teachers encourage buddies to always ask for help and guidance. One of their lessons is to learn that sometimes adults can't always tell you what to do. They grow to understand that teachers want kids to learn self-reliance and think for themselves. That's why these teachers and students come to the Buddy Program twice a week!
