## ETTO PARENTERUCE

hope this issue of the Comet Newsletter finds you in the very best of health and spirit as we prepare to welcome the spring season.

As you may know The Fallsburg Central School District received two strands of Federal grant funds; \*Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRSSA) and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) which we hoped to spend on a number of projects including, but not limited to:

•A Modular Classroom Unit housing two Classrooms at the Benjamin Cosor Elementary School

•A Modular Classroom Unit housing two Classrooms at the Junior-Senior High School

•A Storage Building at the Junior-Senior High School

 $\bullet \mbox{District-Wide Unit Ventilator Replacement and Air Conditioning Installation}$ 

While there are additional things that we are utilizing these Federal grant funds for (field trips, community days, auditorium renovation, etc.), the four items named above are the main issue for this newsletter.

Our main problem is that these CRSSA and ARP strands that we have access to have to be "spent" by particular deadlines. These deadlines are September 2023 (CRSSA) and September 2024 (ARP) respectively. "Spent" means that all materials and equipment will need to be ordered, received, installed, and fully paid for by those deadlines. Ultimately, the Federal grants funds must be fully liquidated by September 2023 and September 2024. There are no exceptions to these dates. We have lobbied various entities only to find that the Federal Government has no intention of extending the deadlines for when the monies have to be "spent."

Originally, we had planned to do several projects utilizing the first strand of Federal grant funds before the deadline of September 2023. Unfortunately, we will not have the time to complete the work planned for the first strand of Federal grant funds by the September 2023 deadline. Therefore, we must reallocate the funding strands. We will have to utilize some of the second strand of Federal grant funds, which must be "spent" by September 2024, to complete some of the work originally scheduled to be finished by September 2023.

The Issue: There are very long procurement times relative to having the Modular Classroom Units built and delivered to the sites. Since these Modular Classroom Units are permanent, they must undergo a lengthy building

inspection process with the New York State Education Department and the New York State Department of State after fabrication and prior to their delivery to the sites. Furthermore, due to some material shortages, there are very long procurement times related to the fabrication of equipment associated with the Unit Ventilator replacements and Air Conditioning installations. As a result, we are not going to be able to complete all four Projects that are noted above.

Consequently, we had to make a choice between the Modular Classroom Units and the Unit Ventilator replacements and Air Conditioning installations. The Buildings and Grounds Committee had been tasked with choosing between the Modular Classroom Units and the Unit Ventilator replacements and Air Conditioning installations. We have met with the Architects, Engineers, and Construction Managers to review the options and potential scenarios for these Projects in question to help inform the decision.

After some deliberation, we have decided that the priority for the Federal funding is to utilize it for new Modular Classroom Units, in lieu of new Unit Ventilators and Air-Conditioning. Our Classrooms within the buildings are currently meeting or exceeding their maximum capacities. We also plan to move forward with full-day Pre-K. Because of this, it is important that additional learning spaces are provided at the buildings. While new Unit Ventilators and Air-Conditioning would be a nice luxury, we are prioritizing the new Modular Classroom Units to ensure we can provide learning spaces which can accommodate the needs of the students in the community. At this time we are looking into classroom sized air conditioners for the short term to address the summer heat. Additionally, we are also planning to enhance the planned auditorium upgrades, installing lockers at the elementary school and replacing the two BCES playgrounds. We are moving ahead and planning to utilize the Federal grant funding strands to complete the Projects for the Modular Classroom Units and the Storage Building at the Junior-Senior High School. The construction for these Projects is slated to begin this Summer (late June 2023).

Hello Fallsburg Families,

As I write this, we are approaching the first days of Spring, which typically is a time of renewal and growth. Our students are working hard in their classes, while also thinking ahead to next year's schedule and potential college course pathways. I am also honored to be the current Interim Principal for the building, and I am working alongside our staff to prepare our students for upcoming school milestones. We are continuing to hold assemblies that support student mental health as well provide students with a refresher on safe driving practices.

We recently held our Quarter 2 Honor Roll celebration assemblies. 95 students received Superintendent's Honor Roll awards and 155 students received Honor Roll awards. #### Finding Ways to Communicate with Your Child

In today's fast-paced world, filled with technology distractions, it is important to establish routines that foster communication with our children. It is never too late to set up times in our day to focus on that communication.

According to Linda O'Brien's Parent Guidebook, in order to keep up with what is going on in your child's life; take the time to talk with your child every day. The following tips will help you and your child communicate effectively.

- Ask open-ended questions that require more than one-word answers. Instead of "How was school?" say "Tell me about your day" or "What did you learn in school today?"
- Be available when your child wants to talk. This may be right after your child gets home from school, or before your child goes to bed. Another good time to talk is when you and your child are driving in the car.
- Recognize the importance of nonverbal communication. Children aren't always able to put into words what they want or need their parents to know. It is, therefore, important to pay attention to body language, moods, eating habits, sleeping patterns, and school performance. These can be good indicators of how things are going at school or with friends.
- Regularly spend one-on-one time with your child doing things you both enjoy. Try cooking, shopping, playing a game, or taking a walk. Not only are these good ways to spend quality time with your child, they also provide opportunities for you to answer your child's questions, and to discuss issues and concerns in a safe, comfortable environment.
- Try to eat dinner as a family as often as possible. Research shows that students whose families eat dinner together do better in school. Turn the television off and talk about your day. It's a great time for families to reconnect.
- Above all, cherish the time that you have with your children. They grow up way too fast. By establishing open communication at a young age, you are building a trusting relationship as your child enters his/her teenage years.

Here's to turning off the technology and finding small "family time" moments that will be remembered by our children as they look back on their childhood!
