Fostering a Positive School Climate: Insights from Our Recent Surveys

Dear School Community,

Happy Fall! As we continue to navigate the challenges of education in today's world, it is crucial for us to pause and reflect on the factors that contribute to the overall success of our schools. • Enhancing Communication: We will work on improving communication between the school and parents, ensuring that information is easily accessible and timely.



• Supporting Social and Emotional Well-being: We will explore additional ways to support the social and emotional well-being of our students, providing them with the necessary tools to navigate life's challenges. Our Positive Action Kits provide mini social-emotional lessons and are used in classrooms district-wide. Teachers receive annual SEL training and support as well.

Supporting student relationships: Our Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) and Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP) are programs that work to create positive and safe schools. We work with staff and students each year for continuous improvement. We are also exploring Restorative Justice to help students with relationship and social issues.

A Message From Pupil Personnel Services

In the Pupil Personnel Services Office, we oversee English Language Learners, Special Education, McKinney Vento, Foster Care, and Section 504 Accommodation Plans for students in pre-kindergarten through 12th grade. Through Comet News submissions, we aim to highlight one aspect of Pupil Personnel Services to help provide information and resources to parents/guardians and community members. In this issue of Comet News, we highlight English Language Learners (ELLs).

In Fallsburg, we foster an environment of cultural sensitivity and respect, promoting a diverse and inclusive atmosphere where students can celebrate their unique background while learning English. It is important that we understand what each student's linguistic needs are so we can provide the support and services to ensure their academic success. We follow a comprehensive evaluation process to determine each student's English proficiency level.

Upon entry, new suspected ELLs are administered the New York State Identification Test for English Language Learners (NYSITELL), which provides the English proficiency level for each student - Entering, Emerging, Transitioning, Expanding, or Commanding. The level prescribes the amount of English as a New Language (ENL) units the student will require to support their language development. Parents receive notification of their child's English proficiency, a consent form for ENL services and, if applicable, consent for placement in the Dual Language Program through their child's teacher.

A variety of programs and services are available to meet each student's individual needs.

Our English as a New Language (ENL) program aims to foster language proficiency, academic achievement, and social integration, ensuring your child feels welcomed and empowered in our school community. ENL services are provided by certified ENL educators who specialize in providing differentiated instruction and tailor their teaching methods to meet the unique needs of ELLs. Our Stand-Alone ENL classes offer smaller group instruction, enabling our educators to work closely with your child to enhance their English language skills, whether in listening, speaking, reading, or wr-

iting. Our Integrated classes allow students access to the general education curriculum while providing language support to help them access the material.

The goal of the Bilingual Education (BE) program is to help students become proficient in both languages, typically their native or dominant language and a second language. In the Junior Senior High School, students may take bilingual Social Studies and Math. At Benjamin Cosor Elementary School, students develop proficiency in both languages through the Dual Language Program, where they spend equal parts of their day developing their academic skills in both Spanish and English.

Throughout the year, we regularly assess and monitor students' progress to ensure they are making significant strides in their language acquisition. In the spring, all ELL students take the annual New York State English as a Second Language Achievement Test (NYSESLAT), to determine their progress in acquiring English language skills and to inform instructional decisions. Results from NYSESLAT are mailed in the Fall of the new school year.

FCSD Wins \$51,000 in Sullivan 180 Empowering a Healthier Generation Competition



On September 21, 2023, the Fallsburg Central School District was awarded \$51,000 in grant prize monies at the Sullivan 180 Empowering a Healthier Generation Celebration at Bethel Woods Center for the Arts.

Fallsburg's Benjamin Cosor Elementary School was among five schools in Sullivan County that participated in the Empowering a Healthier Generation Competition. Each school was required to present its wellness initiatives to a group of objective judges. The top grant awards were for \$75,000 and \$50,000.

Benjamin Cosor Elementary School was named the recipient of the \$50,000 grant prize. Additionally, the district was the recipient of the \$500 Nutrition Turtle Award, sponsored by Foster Supply Hospitality, and the Fallsburg Junior-Senior High School was presented with the \$500 Collaborator Turtle Award, sponsored by the Zufall Family Foundation.

The prize money is intended to be spent on improving the outdoor classroom spaces and various wellness programs at Benjamin Cosor Elementary School. Dr. Ivan Katz, Superintendent of the Fallsburg Central School District, was beaming with pride when he stated, "This is a very proud moment in Fallsburg Central School District history, and it is a testament to the hard work and long-time efforts of our school community".

Fallsburg Honors 1993 Section IX Class C Volleyball Championship Team

On September 29, 2023, the Fallsburg Central School District celebrated the 30th anniversary of the 1993 Section IX Class C Volleyball championship team. They welcomed back sisters and former teammates, Zuequal Harrison-Bailey and Muun Queen Malone (née Harrison), to share their experience on the team.

After entering the 1993 playoffs as a fourth seed team, Fallsburg pulled off a significant upset against first seed O'Neill in the first round. Then they went on to defeat second seed Burke Catholic 3-1 in the final round—marking the team's and only sectional being championship since promoted to Class C. Even with their playoff run coming to an end the regional finals, unexpected success will live on in perpetuity.

Zuequal Harrison-Bailey, who was a senior and team captain during the 1993 team earned a full scholarship to play volleyball at Virginia Union University. Upon graduation, she became the volleyball coach at her alma mater—winning Coach of the Year and appearing in three conference championship games. She currently resides in Richmond, Virginia and manages a non-profit organization that provides guidance for school children.

Muun Queen Malone, a junior during the 1993 season, earned the position of team captain after Zuequal's departure. Upon graduation, she attended Hampton University to pursue a career in nursing.
