I just wanted to follow up on presentation of the class board meeting about the after-school program because there were concerns all of them legitimate about the fact that we had we're having a great difficulty in the after-school program because of the grant limitations and I want to tell you that I think we've come a long way in two weeks in terms of the information that we're Gathering the planning we have and the support that I've gotten from board members staff and students on being able to take a new look at this initiative. That's kind of been an obstacle for us thus far in the school year. I've gotten information from board members who shared information on previous grants that that were similar to this that were very helpful in underscoring the differences. I appreciate that and we're using that to move forward because we are going to be lobbying State Education Department officials as well. Working with assembly woman Gunther who has worked on this grant with us very closely over the past couple years because this isn't the first issue we've had with the Empire State Grant so we did have a follow-up meeting with the administrators to kind of brainstorm on the after-school program and to isolate what our main blocks are. I had a meeting with Emily and Miss Baum, and and I think yeah to look at how we can And get more students involved and and Emily and Ms. Baum and Ms. Mejia came up with some great suggestions that resulted in us, not only putting a second survey together getting the information out to parents also in Spanish, but having the the surveys being redone during classes to make sure that all kids have an opportunity to do it. We're gonna take a look at what that survey results are. Once that that's completed in the next couple weeks. We've I've also reached out from fellow who is in the same boat with the Empire Grant faces the same constraints that we do because one of the biggest issues is the fact that we have to run it five days a week for three hours a day without any

flexibilities built in but one of the helpful things about what we shared with me in previous iterations of the grant is that there was much more flexibility written in and we're hoping to use that information for when we meet with these various officials to see if we can get some flexib To relief on the ground. We're also going to be re-serving our staff to see what we can do to put the program together because I think everyone is on the same page in terms of wanting to move the program forward. We've had different versions of this over the past 15 years that I've been here and I was happy to see that people were passionate as they were and are about how important this is because we've had it and it's an opportunity. We don't want to lose. So we have some things in place. We're reaching the surveys. We'll keep I'll keep you posted that this level once those are done and after the lobbying efforts that we do to see if we can get some ideas on

21:08 Ivan Katz: how to use the program with the constraints we have and see if we can get any relief from our legislators and state officials and hopefully we'll be able to have a brighter Outlook moving forward, but I want to thank everyone who participated thus far and those who are going to continue. Will work with us to try to get some positive movement for our after-school programs. So, thank you everyone for that. and we the we've also been working on the budget. 22:52 Dan Grecco: There's a resolution on the board tonight for approving a contract with Auctions International Inc. Auctions International is a company that will auction the district Surplus items. We have over time accumulated a great number of surplus items that the board has a surplus but because of the pandemic we have not been able to have a public bid where people would come in and look at the items and place sealed bids. So Mr. Tranchina art or director of facilities has found Auctions International. They will list our items by Lots on their website, which is auctions international.com. There is a fee of 29 \$25 per lot which is reduced by the buyers premium. So the more that the buyer pays for the lot the the premium will increase and any thing that's over \$250 would be free to the district if for any reason a lot receives There is no charge. Does anyone have any questions on that? All right moving on to

the 2122 school budget.

24:28 Sean Wall-Carty: a thousand and if we or when not selling it for less than a thousand because it didn't hit the reserve. And then do we still get a charge?

24:36 Dan Grecco: We would still receive a charges \$25 for that but we could always relist the items at a lower Reserve.

24:43 Sean Wall-Carty: Okay. All right. So even if it doesn't hit the reserve if somebody bids with that's the charge, correct.

24:50 Dan Grecco: Correct. Yes.

24:50 Sean Wall-Carty: Okay, perfect.

24:53 Dan Grecco: Yeah. Moving on to the 2021 the 2021 2022 school budget as Dr. Katz has said we've been working on it traditionally tonight at tonight's meeting. We would have unveiled the rollover budget. Typically the rollover budget is an aggregate increase of about two and a half to three and a half percent. So far the rollover budget looks like it will fall within that range. But we are having difficulty estimating the impact of operating a school district in a pandemic environment the school budget for this period would be starting July 1 where assuming that we would still be feeling the impacts of the pandemic for that period and we're trying to determine what the school year will look like. We have received preliminary state aid information. We received it this morning. We're working to determine what our actual allocation will be. There are some federal monies in that allocation. It looks like the district just looking at the the total that it looks like the district will be receiving more state aid in 2122 than we are receiving in 2021. However, part of that is a federal allocation, which will have to be passed through to private schools. And we're trying to determine how much of that will be passed on through the flow throughs to the private schools. And how much will be meaning February 3rd will have a more

comprehensive budget presentation. Are there any questions at this time?

26:37 Ivan Katz: I have a comment if I may.

26:41 Dan Grecco: Yes.

26:43 Ivan Katz: So the budget committee met yesterday to discuss some things that Mr. Greco talked about and the governor also gave his budget presentation yesterday, but it's probably the least definitive budget presentation. I've seen in a very long time there wasn't a lot of clarity or specificity the governor spoke about a really a two-tiered but it one where he anticipates a worst case scenario of the state receiving six billion dollars in in stimulus monies for for the state budget for this year and his best case scenario them giving us 15 billion dollars which in his estimation would make the state a home. So the aid runs that we got which are admittedly better than I had expected. We still don't have enough information because of what Mr. Echo just here in terms of some federal monies that are not broken down yet because we do have the tools and we're hoping by the next by actually by next Tuesday when the budget committee meets again, that will have some more clarity and we'll have a better picture of the rollover budget that will be presenting at the February 3rd board meeting, but there is a lot of Uncertain uncertainty as still. We know that in the past the governor does his initial budget. We plan conservative conservatively based on those numbers, ultimately the legislature negotiates a budget and raises the allocation that the end but but these are much different times. So those past experiences probably not going to be indicative of what we see this time around. So we just need to be a little patient as get more information. We'll share it in the next few workshops and the budget committee will be working to try to get as much clarity as possible. So thank you budget committee members and more to come on the budget.
